#### Holy Family Academic Decathlon Team Scores a Major Victory!

n a history-making victory for the Holy Family School Academic Decathlon team, our 10 decathletes took second place in the 101-school Los Angeles Archdiocese competition, earning a place at the May state championship with wild cheers of joy from dozens of supporters who attended the stress-filled day of competitive testing.

In an especially victorious moment, the team scored a second place in the tough logic competition, marking the first time that the Holy Family team has placed in the top 10 in that test. The team jumped to their feet with excitement and supporters rose in a wild standing ovation as

decathlon officials hung medals around their necks.

The logic win, combined with a strong fourth place showing in the super quiz and stellar performances among individual test takers propelled the team to the top standing—and a new high for Holy Family decathletes. The first place school, St. Lawrence of Redondo Beach, scored only slightly higher than Holy Family.

The minutes leading up to the final winners' announcements were rife with excited guessing among spectators in the Los Angeles Sports Arena stands—and plenty of lightning-speed calculations by our coaches, Mrs. Barker and Miss Osti.



"We had a feeling we were likely to place in the top-five, but No. 2? We are unbelievably thrilled!" said Mrs. Barker. "Our decathletes have worked incredibly hard since summer and have earned this championship slot after countless hours of study, teamwork and dedication."

The decathlon culminated months of intense studying in which our students poured over books, websites and memorized hundreds of flashcards related to 12 mind-bending subject areas and tests. The logic win, in particular, is a stellar achievement for the team because it is widely known as the most vexing

part of the competition, with questions on spatial reasoning, anagrams, probability and lateral thinking.

What made a difference this year, the coaches said, was a new strategy in approaching the test. Call it logical testing! Instead of the entire team working on every problem, each decathlete was identified for their particular area of strength. This allowed each decathlete to work on a few problems, allowing them more time to get it right. It worked!

Now, just when our students thought they could close the books and bury the flashcards, comes six  $\frac{1}{2}$

"We would not have done as well as we did without the support of our parents," Mrs. Barker said.

You can spot our champion decathletes around campus, sporting bright yellow sweatshirts. And check out our giant trophy—a testament to the academic achievement of Holy Family School.

### Where Do I Fit into the Gospel?

For many years, the Spirituality docents have entered the classrooms each month with a very specific purpose of modeling the mission of Holy Family parish: "connecting faith with life and serving those in need." As Monsignor Connolly explained a few weeks ago, we must find where we fit into the Gospel to be able to live as disciples of Jesus. If we're still figuring this out as adults, where does this leave our children? Well, this is precisely where the Spirituality Program shines with about a dozen of us who share stories that give a human side to our faith — exactly what Jesus did when he encountered the woman at the well who thirsted, like us and our children, to be connected to God.

Connecting faith with life...Well, the children are in for a treat this month as the virtues of obedience and devotion are discussed after reading either a beautiful rendition of *Noah's Ark* (Kinder–2nd grade) or the wonderfully told and illustrated *The Lady of Guadalupe by Tomie de Paola* (3rd–5th grades). The striking part of both of these stories is that God appeared to the most ordinary among us, which ultimately led to extraordinary, miraculous feats. Docents will share their own personal stories of obedience and devotion growing up as children.

Serving those in need...Similar to last month, the children are asked to thank their parents and demonstrate how they can be more devoted and obedient at home. Hopefully the children will come to the understanding that those in need are often those closest to us—our families.

# Living the Golden Rule: Treat Others the Way You Want to Be Treated.

Yesterday at assembly I spoke to the children about treating others like we want to be treated. They know the Golden Rule, but they don't practice it sometimes. They can tell me the answer to the question: "What would Jesus do? ", but this doesn't always govern their actions. I spoke to them about pranks which are not pranks.

Someone had taken someone's lunch, and that is stealing not a prank. I reminded them that we were receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation this week, and they needed to search their souls about being mean or hurting others and then laughing or teasing them. Everyone at school needs to be safe from physical harm, but more importantly mental harm.

The next thing I emphasized to them is that they cannot stand by and permit people to be teased or bullied. They must be a caring crowd and not a silent crowd. Bullies obtain their power when no one stands up and says STOP. I told them that the teachers and I can assist them. They only need to ask. We have been working with individuals in the past who have bullied, and this is the most effective deterrent. We need to KNOW about incidents and not find out about them weeks later. Some students have been courageous and come

to me, and we have stopped the teasing. I check back with the people who have been teased frequently.

We want children to want to come to school and be peaceful, not anxious about being teased. Having anxiety about social situations inhibits their full learning potential. As I often say, "It takes a village" and this Holy Family community wants the best for every child. Please assist us by letting me know or your child's teacher if your child is being teased or bullied in any way.

We have continued to address these issues in classes, but knowing something in your head is not the same as knowing it in your heart. We will continue to talk about Jesus and how he wants us to treat others.


